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Voice and agency.



Our aim is to create and maintain a school environment that is inclusive and empowering. A learning environment that values the positive contributions of students and creates a sense of belonging and connectedness that is conducive to positive behaviours and effective engagement in learning.

Over the course of 2017 we have canvassed feedback on how we are doing broadly speaking as a school in relation to your children's education. This has included the Student Attitudes to School Survey, the Parent Opinion Survey, the Junior School Council Survey of Student of the Week, the Canteen Survey, the Communications Survey and a variety of student focus groups.

The common goal is school improvement. Where every student gets the best possible outcomes and we all contribute to that journey. The feedback from these sources naturally are a mixed bag of positives, negatives and neutral assessments. Overall results are very positive tempered with thoughts and suggestions of how we can continue to improve and grow.

Below is a snapshot of the positives, negatives and interestings (PMI) from a variety of sources and some of the actions planned or are currently in train.

Source: Student Attitudes to School Survey (students in Years 4 to 6) 95% of students feel that teachers have appropriately high expectation of them although 13% are reticent to share their concerns with the teaching staff. While 87% (and 9% respectively neutral) feel a strong connectedness to school and 89% (and again 9% respectively neutral) feel social included 15% (and a further 17% neutral) do not feel that they have a strong sense of voice and agency in their school.

This Term focus groups will be run with small groups from Foundation to Year 3 to hear the voice of our younger students; yard duty teachers will make it clear that students have been heard and concerns are addressed in the playground; a social skills program is being explored to target poor and build appropriate behaviours and positive attitudes; opportunities for leadership and voice will be created in the Year 5 and to some extent the Year 4; policies such as bullying and our student wellbeing programs – "you can do it" and "habits of mind" are being evaluated and our transition programs are being reviewed.

The preliminary summary report of the Parent Opinion Survey results aligns with that of the Student Attitudes to School Survey with some subtle differences including the need to continue to build strong relationships with the local community and continuing to develop effective two-way communication between the teachers and parents that focuses of student progress as well as a need to address the state of the school's facilities and grounds.

In 2017 COMPASS replaced Skoolbag as a solution for enabling better management of processes, better communication and better engagement. Class are also using

class dojo and a number of other platforms for communication. We are aware that having more than one direct means of communication has caused issues and we are working to resolve these. In time we hope to move to a space where all communications are clear, come from one (or maybe two) platform(s) and are unable to be missed. Our communications group – a recently formed group comprising of teachers, parents and admin – are working on a variety of strategies including best use of Newsletter, Website, COMPASS and social media.

Parents want to know how they can support and help their child at home so there will be helpful hints and resources for you in the newsletter and on the website.

While not so much was said of social media it continues to be the subject of debate in the media so we will organise several social media specific education sessions for senior students and parents run by the Victorian Police in Term 4. This program has received outstanding feedback from other primary and secondary schools.

The community told us that buildings and grounds are an issue. In 2018 a new building will replace the single-story portables along Ailsa grove and the main building on Waterdale road will see significant classroom upgrades. In Term 1 students, teachers, education support staff and parents had input in to the planning of the new school building.

Last term we renovated the children's toilets as part of the great restroom reno. This Term we will see the completion our new passive play areas around the edge of Tate Street and the lane; the Year 2 play equipment resurfaced with a rubber compound to prevent injuries and the front of the school will be repainted.

A great deal of this would not be possible without your assistance through the schools working bee program and section B and C of the voluntary contribution.

Last term members of the Junior School Council developed a survey in response to mixed feelings about the length of assemblies and Star of the Week. While the results were clear that Star of the week is a fantastic honour & to stand up in front of the school is very special it was clear from the responses that changes need to be made.

71% of respondents thought a change to the format was a good idea.

45% voted for the student's name the Habit of Mind (Grade 5/6) and You Can Do It Key (Foundation to Grade 4) and reason for the Star of the Week to be in the newsletter. Students will be called up at assembly in the Habit of Mind/You Can Do It Key groups and NO reason for the Star of the Week will be read out at assembly.

The parent opinion survey told us that some parents would like to know more about the Habits of Mind and You Can Do It programs and we will look at ways we can communicate this in the near future. The first thing that will happen is making explicit links between Star of the Week, Habits of Mind, You can do It and the School Values. Junior School councillors were actively engaged in the selection of murals for the restroom renovation.

Teachers and staff will continue to work with the Junior School Council to actively seek opportunities for all students to have input in to their schooling.

Nude Food – let's start the term right.

UNDERSTAND NC T Packaged vs. Perfect Nude food

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The nude food program is a big part of our sustainability program and is achieving mixed results. The idea is for each of us to build a nutritious, rubbish free lunch for a healthy body and a healthy planet!

Nude foods are food items that are free from disposable packaging. So, essentially, kids bring their food to school in their lunch box ... nude! This approach reduces the amount of rubbish in school bins, the playground and, ultimately, has a positive environmental impact on our planet.

Unfortunately, lunchboxes, particularly lids are going missing from where they are being left outside and are ending up used in the sandpit and play areas where they are abandoned. We are looking for a solution but for now please remind your child(ren) that they must not use their own or anyone else's lunch containers other than for storing food.

Synthetic soccer pitch and new playground areas.

With more rain than anticipated in the school break some of our works have been held up. The new playground areas are now scheduled to be completed in the next few weeks so we are limited in play space at present.

Also there has been water damage beneath the synthetic surface of the soccer pitch necessitating that a section of it be fenced off until it can be repaired. This work has been scheduled for as soon as possible in October.



I suggest students bring books or none valuable passive play activities to school to occupy themselves while repairs are made.

Bike riding to school.

The Ride2School Network of which we are a part says "Students who ride or walk to school contribute to their minimum physical activity level of 60 minutes per day. They are also more focused and ready to learn compared to those who are driven."Riding to school safely is not just about rider awareness but also navigating congested

traffic. Therefore riding your bike in the streets adjacent to the school is not allowed. If you ride along the bike path at the bottom of Ailsa Grove you **must** walk your bike to school from there and of course when you leave school walk your bike to the bike path. **Walk to School in Banyule**

The City of Banyule and Vic Health are promoting health and fitness through their walk to school program. Get ready, get set for Walk to School Month!

IPS and COMPASS.

The school management system we use at IPS is Compass. Compass provides the school community with a range of facilities which streamline communication and provide enhanced access to information.



As this is our first year we will continue to implement further features in steps as they are developed. Parents play an important role in this initiative. It is essential that you log in at least once a week to keep up to date with future events and access the news feed.

Currently Compass facilities at IPS include:

1. UPDATE YOUR DETAILS THROUGH THE PORTAL

Change of email addresses and mobile phone numbers can be easily updated as we will use these to send communication emails to families.

2. EXCURSIONS/INCURSIONS

Approve and pay for your child's participation in excursions/incursions and other special events (these are electronic permissions – there is no need to print off permission slips).

3. PARENT PAYMENT & FINANCIAL CONTRIBUTIONS

You are able to pay School Fees (compulsory payments, digital technologies cocontribution and voluntary payments) online.

4. PERMISSIONS

Give permission for your child to attend local excursions, to have photo/audio/video recordings taken and used at school, and to agree to the ICT / DLT computer usage.

5. NEWS FEED

Newsletters will be available online and a link sent to via Compass. The school will post news to remind you about events and activities at the school. Eventually your news feed will be customised, showing only the information relevant to you and your children.

6. ATTENDANCE

View your child's attendance online, approve absences and indicate future absences. Each family listed in the school administration database has a unique login for Compass.

We are developing a page on the IPS website with links and tutorials designed to help us all get to know and become comfortable with the system however sometimes it's less confronting just to ask so please...
