### What is school for? Ask a Year 6 student from Ms Cook or Ms O'Connor's class.

Like all organisations, schools can get locked into routines and impede change. Schools need to innovate to prepare kids for a dynamic and uncertain future. Small steps lead to big change and it can be a good thing for students to experience a range of pedagogies as they travel through school. Our senior students are exploring these notions as we head towards Term 4.

Over the next two weeks and into next term, I'm spending time working with the Year 6 students on some big questions.

What is school for? And what is learning?

Did you know that 'educate' comes from the Latin Educe which means to draw forth or bring out? On Wednesday some of the Year 6s touched on the following big statements.

"The biggest predictor of success is emotional health and self-control".

"There is a difference between people who are smart and people who score better on tests".

"Don't be afraid to fail".

"Your destiny is in your hands".

The results from the Student Attitudes to School Survey tells us our students have a lot to say and a lot to add to the way our school operates.

We want to find out from our students what is important to them and why. The table on the right contains their thinking. The discussion was fun and produced some interesting responses and I thank them for their willingness to share and have a voice.

I think as we move on next week to explore learning and what it is from the student perspective, we can incorporate more of their thinking in to the curriculum. Small steps lead to big change.

The future looks bright.

## Want to help your child? Turn maths into a story.

By presenting mathematics as a story children can make links to their everyday life.

Turn everyday events or objects into a maths story:

Count the fruit in the fruit bowl. Cut a piece of fruit into six pieces. Count the pieces of toast you cooked at breakfast. Add the total of the cutlery at the table. Count the number of people travelling in the tram or in the car beside you. Change this in to a writing activity. For example: there are five pieces of fruit in this bowl. Three are apples and two are bananas. My nude food lunchbox has six things inside. One sandwich, one orange and two bits of cheese, a bowl of rice and some sushi.


Also, the votes are in on Free Dress Friday (a student initiative) and will go to School Council as a motion in October. Stay tuned.

## Littering







#### R U OK?



# **PFA Bunnings sausage sizzle**


This **Saturday** its the PFA is running the IPS School fundraising sausage sizzle at Bunnings Northland from **9-4pm**.

# November 24th - IPS Mini-Market


